Florida Sales Tax Holidays



To help Floridians fight the cost of inflation, the State has announced several sales tax holidays for shoppers:

◆ **May 28 - June 10, No sales tax on hurricane supplies:** Projected to save shoppers \$25.6 million. They will be able to avoid paying sales taxes on an array of items, from packages of batteries and radios under \$50 to generators up to \$1,000. The hurricane-season holiday for the first time will include pet supplies

◆ **July 1 - July 7:** Shoppers will be able to avoid paying sales taxes on such things as tickets for concerts, movies, ballgames and museum visits, as well as on certain gear for outdoor activities. For example, they will not pay sales taxes on the first \$500 of the price of canoes or kayaks.

◆ **July 25 - August 7:** Back to school tax days: Shoppers will be able to avoid paying sales taxes on clothes and shoes that cost \$100 or less, school supplies that cost \$50 or less and personal computers with price tags of \$1,500 or less. Economists estimate the holiday's impact to total \$100.1 million.

September 3 - September 9: During the period, people will be able to avoid paying sales taxes on certain tools and other work equipment

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SHARE THE ROAD

On Mother's Day a cyclist, who owns a home in Chokoloskee, suffered serious injuries when a dark-colored pickup truck veered off the road onto his bike lane, about a mile north of Everglades City along CR29. This experienced bicyclist was training for an Ironman competition and was forced off the road when he crashed. Things could have been much worse if he hadn't swerved into the grass and the truck had actually hit him. Fortunately, someone driving out of town found him lying on the side of the road and incoherent. He was taken to the hospital and in his own words he said -

"As far as myself, my clavicle was broken and at a 90-degree angle but fortunately it was in the dead middle, so the surgeon was able to put it back in perfect alignment with the assistance to two metal plates. That combined with a completely fractured scapula, something the

doctors had not seen before, caused me to have a "floating" shoulder as there was nothing structurally holding it up. The CT also revealed ribs 2 - 7 were broken but only a couple "real bad".

Accidents do happen and cyclists are at a disadvantage; however, the driver should have stopped and assisted; that is, if the driver had even seen the cyclist. Texting and driving can be fatal. Maybe this was the case, and the driver was distracted and didn't even realize what had happened. So, what are the written, and unwritten, "rules of the road"?

In Florida the bicycle is legally defined as a vehicle, and bicyclists have the same rights to the roadways and must obey the same traffic laws as the drivers of other vehicles. See <https://floridabicycle.org/bicycle-traffic-law> for more information.

In the past 23 years my husband and I have cycled approximately 75,000 miles on back roads and busy highways all around the United States and in Europe, and I remember only one incident when a driver

purposely tried to run us off the road. We have rear-view mirrors but always hear cars or trucks even before seeing them coming from behind. We were on a county road on our first trip across the U.S. and I saw the truck coming towards me, then heard two boys yell to scare me off the road. Fortunately, I could see what was coming and moved quickly into the grass, prepared for their behavior. I was worried, however, that Steve would not see him since he was quite a distance in front of me. I tried to warn him; he didn't hear me, but he also saw the truck coming.

All of this is a total lack of respect for others on the road. We try to be courteous when cycling, riding as far as possible to the right-hand side of the road or in the shoulder when there is one. In turn, we expect the same respect from drivers of cars/trucks. As often as possible we like to bike early in the morning to Chokoloskee and back around town, a good 10-mile ride; it's beautiful cycling along the causeway and quiet roads where we live. In general, although many vehicles ride faster than the speed limit, they do give us room and adhere to the 3-foot rule or even pull over to the far lane if possible. That's being courteous; doesn't take much to be kind when sharing the road. Only occasionally does a car or truck pass us too closely. We will never know, on Mother's Day, who veered into the bike lane causing the Chokoloskee man to crash, but it is a warning to all of us to take care whether you're the one riding the bicycle or driving the car. Share the Road and prevent accidents.

Editors Note:

The photo in this article is a picture taken of the actual sportswear the rider was wearing the day of his accident. He should have been very visible!

Even though the rider was not hit by the vehicle, contact was only avoided by the rider swerving out of the way to avoid being hit. His quick reaction may have saved his life, but it also caused his serious injuries.

According to the Department of Transportation, distracted driving is responsible for even more accidents than drunk driving. Approximately 7% of all fatal crashes involved a distracted driver.

Approximately 1 out of 5 people killed by distracted drivers were either walking, jogging or riding a bike.

Distracted driving is the cause of 58% of all crashes involving teenaged drivers.

Paying attention to the road, even those in less congested areas, is the one way to avoid such accidents. Be safe. Pay attention!

Years ago, I had a really neat silver painted car! It was a Buick. And it received looks of admiration and appreciation wherever I went. It was the sportiest "flivver" I had ever owned. That baby had two curved gull-wing tinted glass panels in the roof over the driver and passenger. They could be removed and let you drive with the wind blowing your hair and letting the sun shine on your face. I put a CB radio in her and named her Silver Cloud. I would tune into the different channels and loved listening to the truckers talk.

"Hey, big Red. Where are you?"

"I'm at mile marker 179 and rollin' with the hammer down!"

"Better watch it. Smokey's at 183."

"That's okay. I got a fella' in my rocking chair. He'll get it."



That Silver Cloud was really something to drive. She was more of an outdoor experience than transportation. You could hear everything around you! No more being couped up inside an air-conditioned box. No Sirree. Now, you could breathe fresh air!

Then, one sad day, I traded Silver Cloud in for another car. That led to a long line of successors. None of them ever had that open roof I loved. Fishing in the 10,000 Islands With Capt. Mike Merritt



May has brought us some really nice conditions. The mornings have started out cool. But the afternoons are showing signs of summer heat! Soon it will be everyday afternoon rains. We will be glad for that afternoon cool down when it happens.

Snook fishing has definitely been different this year. I am catching some big Snook, but not in the usual places yet. Still having to search for them every day. I am normally throwing top water lures and getting a good bite in the AM but so far it has been slow for this. Looking forward to more of it in June. Still catching good Snook in the back country and rivers. And it seems there are still plenty of big fish offshore. It's in the islands that we are struggling to find good numbers of fish. This should change as the month progresses.

Redfish have been the toughest catch. I found fish in a couple areas but not large numbers. I guess we will have to see what the fall brings us this year.

Seatrout are still around in good numbers and good size fish are being caught. Jigs, DOA's. and live baits are catching them on the flats. Our grasses have never recovered but there are fish hanging where other types of grass have grown in place of the turtle grass.

Tarpon are still around and will be around all summer. They may not be in large numbers but enough fish to make it exciting. With the warmer water temps there are of course more Sharks than ever. They can ruin some good fishing. If I have a large Shark come after a big fish or even hit one then I leave that spot. No sense in feeding these great fish to the Sharks. Use a little self control and move on. It's not worth killing these big female Snook when you know the Sharks are there. My clients always understand.

Enjoy the weather, hydrate, and catch the big ones! Good luck fishing! ~Capt. Mike Merritt

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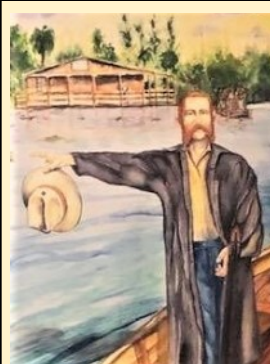

The Island Life Recipes

Shrimp ala King by Janet Hamm

Ingredients:

- 18 Shrimp, cooked (steam or boil)
- 1/2 Cup mushrooms, chopped
- 1/2 Cup onions, chopped
- 1 tablespoon parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon chives
- 1 can cheddar & broccoli soup
- 1/2 cup mild cheddar, shredded
- Parmesan cheese
- Pasta of your choice, spaghetti or noodles (rice OK, too)



Directions:

In a skillet, sauté mushrooms, onions and parsley in olive oil until soft. Add in the rest of the ingredients and cook over medium heat until well blended. Stir often so the cheese does not burn on the bottom. Add in a bit of parmesan cheese to taste. While you are cooking the shrimp dish, prepare your pasta so it is ready to serve immediately.

Serve hot over prepared pasta. Use parmesan cheese as a garnish. You can also serve this over potatoes, biscuits or toast!

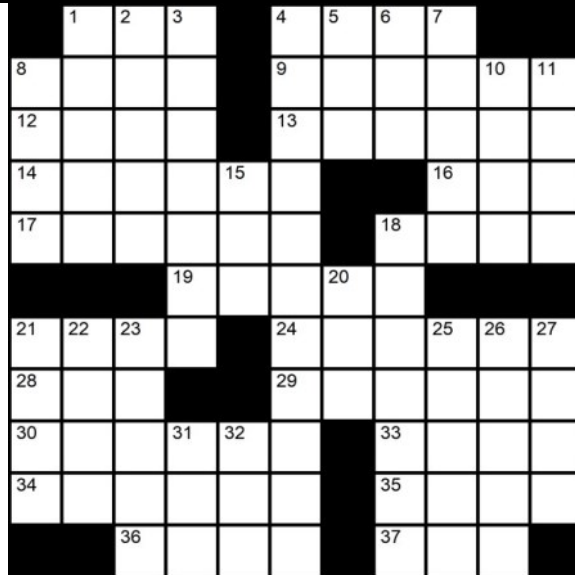
Yes, it is a bit warmer and a tad muggier, but it is all worth it when you take a ride around town.
