Groundbreaking for New Everglades City Sewer Plant Scheduled for July 21st!

Where: Everglades City Wastewater Treatment Plant, 401 South Copeland

Avenue, Everglades City, FL **Date:** July 21, 2022

Time: 10:00 am

It has been a long, and sometimes, frustrating, process but good things take time!

After securing grant funding to start the sewer plant earlier this year, the official groundbreaking has been scheduled for the construction of the new, state-of-theart sewer plant in Everglades City. Anyone who is interested is invited to attend!

The new plant will be built to withstand a 100-year flood and hurricane force winds on the same site where the current plant is located.

The current plant was purchased used many years ago and surpassed its useful life. Most of the equipment at the plant is....well, old, and in bad shape.

A new sewer plant was at the top of every City Official's "to do" list after Hurricane Irma.

Mayor Howie Grimm made it his mission to secure the funds to make it happen. The mayor contacted everyone and anyone who could help the City secure the first round of funding necessary to break ground.

State Senator Kathleen Passidomo has been a tremendous advocate for the plant and was extremely helpful during the grant-seeking process. We thank her for her commitment to our community.

Next, the first phase of construction will begin. Construction of the new plant is expected to take from 18 to 24 months. During construction, it is not expected that residents will not experience any noticeable differences in their service.

Once the first phase is complete the plant can be expanded for surrounding communities.

FWC: Be a hero for beach-nesting birds

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is asking beachgoers to help protect vulnerable beach-nesting birds while enjoying Florida's coastal habitats this summer.

Each spring and summer, shorebirds and seabirds rely on Florida's sandy beaches for critical nesting habitat. Everyone headed to our shorelines can make a big difference in shorebird and seabird nesting success. Be a hero for beach-nesting birds by following these simple shorebird-friendly tips:

Do the flock walk. Keep at least 300 feet from nesting birds and walk around flocks of birds and stay out of posted areas. Getting too close to nesting shorebirds, seabirds and wading birds can cause them to flush from their breeding sites, leaving vulnerable eggs and chicks exposed to the elements and predators. Egg temperatures can increase to lethal levels after just a few minutes of direct sun exposure. Shorebirds and seabirds nest in shallow scrapes in the sand and their eggs and chicks are well-camouflaged, making them vulnerable to being stepped on unless people look out for them and walk around flocks of birds.

Look for Critical Wildlife Area closures. Be on the lookout for signs designating Critical Wildlife Areas on the beach or coastal islands – these areas are closed to public access to protect high concentrations of wading birds and shorebirds while they nest and raise their chicks. Boaters and beachgoers can help nesting birds by keeping distance and noise volumes low near CWAs

Keep Fido at home. Even well-behaved dogs can frighten shorebirds, causing them to abandon their eggs and chicks. If you bring your dog with you to the shore, go to a beach where they're allowed and follow all leash laws

Properly stash all trash. Trash and food scraps attract predators, such as raccoons and crows, that prey on shorebird eggs and chicks.

Fishing in the 10,000 Islands With Capt. Mike Merritt



Well, the inshore fishing has definitely been challenging. I am catching some good Snook, but not in the numbers I usually do this time of year, and not in the usual places either. We should be catching plenty of oversize fish in the Islands and on the outside, but at the time I am writing this they still have not shown up.



Hopefully this changes as we are now getting some pretty regular afternoon rains. Salinity levels always affect this and we are hoping for a good spawn this year. It seems the data shows a direct correlation with rainfall and successful spawn years for the Snook.

The Reds are still here just in decreased numbers which can be very typical for summer fishing. You can still manage to get a few for dinner but catching 20 Reds a day is not normal right now.

Fishing shallow and fishing close to the mangrove edges is key right now. I am catching most of mine on the early part of the incoming tide. If you can get really shallow you will find some you can sight cast.


Tarpon are still here and as we said they will be here all summer too. We are finding fish from very large to small 5 lb. fish and everything in between. This just depends on the area you are in. I am generally an opportunist for the Tarpon, meaning if the opportunity arises I will fish for them. That being said you can spend the day waiting for shots at moving fish and the chance to get your trophy. It's a great way to spend the day and you never know what else you might see.

There are more Goliath Grouper AKA "Jewfish" around these days than ever before so if you want to have some fun fighting some big fish out of the rock holes then make sure you have the right gear. We have caught a couple backcountry fish that were 80+ lbs. this month. Not for the faint of heart or the physically weak! These things will break you off in a heart beat even with 100lb. leader. But, it can be fun for those up to the challenge.

Whatever your pleasure be sure to stay hydrated and carry your bug juice if you plan on getting close to the mangroves! Have fun and be courteous! Good luck fishing.

Sawfish News by Tonya Wiley

To See a Sawfish in Public Aquariums: Making Conservation Connections

The population of smalltooth sawfish (Pristis pectinata) in the United States experienced a dramatic decline during the 20th century due to overfishing and habitat loss, prompting NOAA Fisheries to list the

species as "endangered" under the Endangered Species Act in 2003.



One of the best ways to track the effectiveness of ongoing management and conservation efforts is to collect information about the sawfish encounters of fishers, divers, and others. Details of public sightings and captures of

sawfish can substantially increase the data we have about the species, allowing us to make management and policy decisions that are reflective of the realities in the water. We're seeking help from the angling and diving communities to follow these sawfish interaction guidelines and send us information about their sawfish encounters.

For anglers to safely and legally release any sawfish accidentally caught while fishing:

- Release sawfish immediately
- Leave the sawfish, especially the gills, in the water at all times
- Never lift a sawfish from the water or drag it ashore
- Do not use gaffs or ropes to secure any captured sawfish
- Cut the line as close to the hook as safely possible
- Share the details of your sawfish catch with scientists

Anglers should note that advertising fishing trips or charters aimed at catching endangered smalltooth sawfish can be considered "targeting," which is a violation of the ESA. Therefore, I strongly urge that the following conservation messaging be included in all social media posts regarding sawfish catches: Sawfish are protected under the Endangered Species Act. Help protect this critically endangered species by following the handling and release guidelines available at www.SawfishRecovery.org.

For divers to safely and legally enjoy encounters with sawfish:

- Keep your distance
- Avoid disturbing sawfish
- Never chase, feed, or touch them
- Share information about your sawfish encounters with scientists

Take steps to put your fatigue to rest By Pastor Bob Wallace

Every once in a while, someone says to me, "I feel like I'm falling apart!"

Most often that means, the person doesn't feel young anymore. With age comes a lower level of stamina and energy. So, what can you do about it? If anything!

Fatigue may range from slight to severe. It's caused either by prolonged physical or mental activity to which a person is without sufficient rest or sleep. Young mothers often reach a stage of exhaustion with crying babies who won't let them rest.

Stress is a huge contributor. It can be older persons caring for a loved one during an extremely long period of illness. It could be after looking at all the bills to be paid and realizing, there just isn't enough in the bank to take care of all of them. It could just be worrying. A lot of people do that. They worry about anything, and anyone.

But if you are feeling tired all the time, there could be an underlying health issue that's the cause. People who feel tired all the time may be

suffering from an undue emotional strain.

A sudden diagnosis by the doctor that's bad news may be the reason. The death of a loved one would certainly add to any number of things that can happen to just wear you down.

I've known some people who are under such a strain they suffer what's known as a breakdown.

A nervous breakdown. A mental breakdown. That's a period of extreme mental or emotional stress when the stress is so great the person is unable to perform a normal day's activities.

There are a lot of warning signs. Fatigue warning signals are caused by health problems such as anemia, diabetes, kidney disease, cardiac problems, cancer, drug addiction and problems with the endocrine gland system.

In any event, if you feel as if you're wrung out and just can't put one foot in front of the other, the problem may be deeper than you think. You should consider consulting your primary doctor and having a complete checkup.

No one likes to say they're not feeling well. So instead of saying, "I feel like I'm falling apart!" wouldn't it be better to say, "I feel great!"

And mean it! Maybe it's time to take steps to put your fatigue to rest.



Red Fox (Vulpes vulpes) Other names: silver fox, cross fox / Status: FL = expanding its range, IUCN = LC / Length: not including the tail, 19-35 in. (49-90 cm) / Height at shoulder: 14-20 in. The red fox is the most widely distributed and successful carnivore on earth. It has 45 recognized subspecies and is found on every continent except Antarctica. It even inhabits the High Arctic where it often out competes the smaller white Arctic fox. Although the red fox was historically found along the northern tier of Florida where the eastern deciduous forest ends, it has recently expanded its range southward and can now be found everywhere in the state except the Keys.

The red fox is similar in size to the gray fox, and the two animals coexist fairly well.

True to the adage, "cunning as a fox," this small canid is a brilliant survivor. There is no doubt that its expansion into Southwest Florida has been on the coattails of our own expansion in the same environment. The red fox eats just about everything, including carrion and flotsam. It also preys on fawns, rabbits, squirrels, moles, mice, birds, raccoons, opossums, reptiles, earthworms, and insects. Although considered a carnivore, the red fox is actually an omnivore; during certain times of the year its diet may consist entirely of plant matter, berries, fruits, and tubers. This ability to alter its diet to whatever foodstuff is readily available is key to the fox's success

The red fox is still trapped extensively for its fur. In the U.S., the Alaskan red fox has the best fur, with silky guard hairs that make it extremely desirable on the fur market. More than 2 million red fox pelts are harvested in the wild worldwide, particularly in Canada and Alaska. Despite this continued trapping, the red fox is not threatened or endangered anywhere in North America, and only two of the 45 subspecies in the world are listed as endangered.

The female, which is called a vixen, has one litter a year with up to 12 kits in a litter. Like its cousin, the coyote, the fox was once common prey for wolves and pumas. With these two top predators gone, many more kits survive, and the fox's numbers are steady to increasing in every state in the Union.

The red fox is too small to seriously injure a human, and though it has been known to attack infants, no reported attack has been fatal. Like the coyote, the red fox will take outdoor house pets such as cats and small dogs and has been known to decimate entire flocks of chickens in a single night. The red fox will sometimes resort to an unusual behavior more commonly found in man—it will overkill prey beyond its immediate needs. Panthers and lions are also known to kill more than they can eat, though no one can explain the biological mechanism behind overkilling.

The red fox is prone to rabies and a number of other potentially lethal human diseases such as tularemia and encephalitis.

Although the red fox is increasing in number, your chances of seeing one of these small, secretive animals in the wild is extremely rare. It tends to hunt at dawn and dusk, and its keen sense of hearing keeps it at a safe distance from noise-making humans. The fox is a surprisingly fast animal, disappearing into the understory in a heartbeat.

Meatball Loaf Bread by Janet Hamm

Ingredients:

3 eggs

1/2 cup milk

1 tbs sugar

1/4 cup oil

1 diced tomato

8 cooked meatballs (use leftovers!), chopped up finely

2 large mushrooms, chopped

2 green onions, chopped

Add a pinch of chives, parsley, Italian seasoning, garlic, and thyme 3 cups of flour

Directions: In a large bowl mix eggs, milk, sugar, oil. Mix in the flour and then the rest of the ingredients.

Pour into a greased and floured loaf pan and bake at 350° for 45 minutes or until a knife comes our clean when you test it. If you like cheese, you can sprinkle a bit of shredded cheddar or parmesan over bread when serving.

Pair this with angel hair pasta and your favorite sauce or gravy. You could substitute leftover meatloaf for the meatballs in this recipe.
