



Major Accomplishments


- Collier County ranked 4th in the state for recycling efforts (2021)

- > 09/23/2022 State of Emergency Declared
- > 09/28/2022 Hurricane Ian made Iandfall Category 4
- > 09/30/2022 Garbage collections resumed
- > 10/03/2022 Debris Removal Commenced 5 Days post landfall
- > 10/06/2022 Opened 4 Recycling Drop-Off Centers for free residential yard waste disposal until 12/15
- > 10/14/2022 Second Debris Site Opened Wiggins
- > 10/22/2022 Hauling Out from Debris Sites Commenced
- > 12/08/2022 Last Day to Drop-Off Hurricane Yard Waste at Recycling Centers
- > 01/08/2023 Last Day to place Hurricane Generated Debris curbside




