PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING Interchange Justification Report June 3, 2009



INTRODUCTION

Collier County Transportation Services Division welcomes you to this public information meeting for the I-75/Everglades Boulevard Interchange Justification Report. The purpose of this public meeting is to give you the opportunity to ask questions and offer comments on this important project. Collier County staff and members of the project team are available this evening to answer your questions.

The county is developing an Interchange Justification Report (IJR) to evaluate the need for a new interchange on I-75/Alligator Alley between Collier Boulevard (CR 951) and SR 29. The project area is shown below. A new interchange along this 21-mile section of I-75 would improve mobility and interstate access for people living and working in eastern Collier County. Improved access to I-75 is especially critical during evacuation events such as hurricanes and brush fires. A new interchange in eastern Collier County would also help to alleviate some of the future traffic congestion projected to occur at the Collier Boulevard (CR 951), Golden Gate Parkway and Immokalee Road interchanges.

IJR PROCESS

An IJR is a formal proposal that documents the need for and the operational impacts of a new interchange on a limited access facility, such as I-75. The IJR for this project will address the following:

- ✓ The existing conditions of the study area roadway network (including current traffic operations);
- ✓ Reasonable alternatives to a new interchange;
- ✓ Future year traffic operations on I-75 (both with and without a new interchange);
- ✓ Environmental fatal flaws:
- ✓ Level of public support; and
- ✓ Consistency with local, regional and state transportation plans.

Since I-75 is under the jurisdiction of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the IJR must be submitted to FHWA for its review and approval. It is FHWA's policy to maintain the safety and integrity of the Interstate Highway System to provide motorists with the highest level of service possible. Limiting access to only justified interchanges is critical to achieving this goal. The IJR for this project is being prepared in consultation with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District One.




INTERCHANGE CONCEPTS

Concepts for a new interchange at either Everglades Boulevard or Desoto Boulevard were developed after extensive data collection and travel demand modeling. These concepts are on display this evening for you to review and comment. Each concept was developed to provide safe access to and from I-75, while minimizing impacts to property owners and the area's sensitive natural resources. The county will continue to evaluate each concept based on engineering and environmental factors to determine the preferred interchange location and configuration.

WHAT'S NEXT

This public information meeting is an important element of the IJR process. The public comments received tonight will help the county determine the preferred alternative. Following this public meeting, the interchange concept evaluations will be completed and the IJR will be prepared. The study team will present the IJR recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) prior to submitting the IJR to FHWA. The approval of an IJR is conditional upon the successful completion and approval of a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study. FDOT is expected to begin the PD&E study in the spring of 2010.
