#### Beach Access

During the June 15 and 16, 2005 Budget Workshop, the Collier County Board of Commissioners discussed how to fund the cost of providing more beach access in Collier County. All five County Commissioners were in agreement that the residents of Collier County deserve to continue receiving the best beach experience possible.

To fund additional beach access, it was proposed that the county increase impact fees for beach access and add another penny to the Tourist Development Tax; and, if this occurred, the county could bond \$8 to \$10 million to put toward increasing beach access throughout the county. Unincorporated Collier County currently has 14 public beach access points and 1,179 parking spaces. Beachgoers struggle to find parking during weekends and holidays.

To enhance the beach going experience in Collier County, at an estimated cost of \$8 million, commitments were made to introduce a shuttle transport that would ferry residents to Keewaydin Island from Bayview Park, include more access in the Vanderbilt Drive/Gulfshore Drive area, construct a boardwalk in the southern part of Clam Pass, and construct a restroom and dune crossover at Tigertail Beach in Marco Island.

The one most contentious issue the BCC discussed at great length during the Budget Workshop was charging a fee for the currently free resident beach pass. County staff estimated that

charging \$20 for the beach passes could generate about \$660,000 a year to pay for beach access projects. Three out of five commissioners were supportive of charging a \$20 fee for a two-year beach parking pass at that workshop.

This issue is furthered complicated by the fact that current residents of the City of Naples would be exempt from the \$20 fee. The county pays the city more than \$400,000 a year to allow county residents with a beach pass sticker to park in city parking spaces near the beaches, which offsets the city's lost parking meter revenues. Residents from the City of Naples with a beach pass likewise are currently allowed to park in county beach parking areas for free. If the county begins charging for resident beach passes, it is uncertain what effect it will have on the city's free beach pass. It could ultimately mean that city residents are permitted to park in the county parking facilities free, while county residents pay the sticker fee. Or, the city may decide to follow the county's lead.

designated as recyclable by the ordinance include: paper, cardboard, glass, plastic, aluminum and ferrous metal.

Beginning Aug. 1, 2005, the firstyear grace period will end and a business may incur fines if it does not have a recycling program in place. To comply with the ordinance, a business may either contract with a recycling hauler or complete a certificate of self-hauling. Exemptions and administrative variances may apply. 





# **County Hires New Directors**

After nearly a year-long search, the Collier County Parks and Recreation Department named Wayne S. Boyer as the new director.

Boyer joins Collier County government after working as the director of Park Services for the City of Memphis; director of Parks and Recreation for the City of Davenport, Iowa; and as the superintendent of Parks and Recreation for the City of Goshen, Ind. He earned a master's degree in recreation and park administration from Indiana University.

The University of Florida/IFAS Extension's new director will begin working August 1.

Robert Halman brings with him 18 years of Extension experience, 12 as a county director and six as a livestock/dairy agent. Halman also served as an assistant secretary for the Maryland Department of Agriculture, Animal Industries and Consumer Services Division and most recently as Agricultural Education Program Liaison at the University of Maryland.





## Citizen Survey

I'm pleased to share with you the findings of our 2005 Collier County Citizen Survey. The telephone poll of 512 adults, age 18 and older, was conducted May 23 – June 3. The goal of the survey is to

give residents the opportunity to inform county officials about their policy preferences and to grade the effectiveness and efficiency of county services and programs. County officials, in turn, use the results to make key decisions, measure progress, plan future steps and improve service delivery.

Generally Collier County residents are satisfied with the services and leadership provided by county government. 55% of the respondents agreed with the following statement: "County officials do a good job running county government." 24% disagreed with

the statement and 21% percent had no opinion. Another similar question produced comparable results. When asked if things in Collier County are moving in the right direction or wrong direction, 62% of respondents believe things are moving the right direction, 21% said things are moving in the wrong direction and 16% had no opinion.

On the subject of taxes, residents were asked if they agree or disagree with the following statement: "The property taxes you pay for county services are generally fair in relation to the value of benefits received." 69.5% of respondents agreed, 15.6% disagreed, and 14.9% had no opinion. 71% of respondents said they would be willing to pay higher property taxes for construction of needed roads, bridges and sidewalks.

On the subject of beaches and beach access, 79% believe county beaches are clean and well maintained. However, only 35% believe there is currently an adequate amount of beach access locations and associated beach parking in

Collier County. 46% believe there is not an adequate amount of beach access and parking.

Citizens gave high marks to the county's response to last year's unprecedented hurricane season. 78% believe the county did a good job preparing the community for the 2004 hurricanes and 77% believe the county provided timely and reliable hurricane information.

Other interesting findings:

93% agree that garbage collection and recycling of trash seem to be working well 90% agree that the overall appearance of the neighborhoods and shopping areas is generally good.

81% agree that the sewage system works well in your neighborhood.

69% agree that the stormwater drainage system works well in your neighborhood.

Some of the demographic data that we collected:

95% of respondents are year-round residents, which is no surprise given the time of year that we conducted the survey.
43% moved to Collier County since

52% are 55 years of age or older. 51% are either full-time or part-time workers and 36.5% are retired.

We're encouraged by the results of the survey and appreciate that a majority of our residents approve of the job we are doing. However, we understand that much more work needs to be done to maintain and improve the quality of life we have come to expect and enjoy in this beautiful place we call home.
