Mayor Sammy Hamilton Resigns After 22 Years Howell "Howie" Grimm Appointed as Pro Tem Mayor Now, What's Next?

After serving as mayor for over 22 years, Sammy Hamilton has resigned as Mayor of Everglades City. In a 5-page resignation letter, Mayor Hamilton cites friction with some of the City Council members because of disagreements on how to resolve the city's ongoing waste water plant problem and other issues. Rather than continue fighting within the city, Mr. Hamilton stated that he felt it was better for the city for him to step aside.

Sammy Hamilton was known as an outspoken but effective politician for Everglades City. In his 22-year stint, he was able to maintain the city's tradition while making numerous improvements. During his tenure, his ability to network within the State government enabled the city to secure grants for road improvements after Hurricane Wilma, restore City Hall, and build a much-needed, multi-million-dollar water plant. Mr. Hamilton also helped the city through a tough transition during the early stages of the net ban that gutted income for many local fishermen.

Mr. Hamilton also was effective in limiting density and enforcing building height restrictions so that over-development would not ruin the small town charm the city is known for. Of course, his outspoken nature ruffled some feathers over the years, but support by local voters was unquestioned. In the last election, Hamilton ran unopposed and would have served through 2019.

Next, the city must appoint a mayor pro tempor (pro tem) from one of 5 council members until a city election can be held in November to elect a mayor to serve out the remaining two years on the current term. The deputy mayor pro tempore, or deputy mayor pro tem, assumes mayoral duties in the event of a mayor's absence due to death, physical incapacity, impeachment or resignation. The Latin term "pro tempore" means "for the time being," so the assignation is temporary. The Pro Tem mayor appointed at the Sept. 5th meeting was Howell Grimm, Jr.

In November, the voters will have to choose 3 seats for the city council and elect a new mayor - which is sure to interest citizens looking for solutions to some of the city's current issues. Current council members are; Elaine Middelstaedt, McBeth Collins, Johnny Potter, Parker Oglesby, and Howell "Howie" Grimm, Jr. The council members whose terms will expire in November are Howell Grimm, Jr., Elaine Middelstaedt and Johnny Potter. Because Howell Grimm was appointed as Mayor, he is technically no longer a council member and there are now 4 seats on the council until the November elections.








Small Town Taylor by Taylor Mayberry "Happy to be Back to School"





My Little Slice of Paradise By Kathy Brock

The 2-week publication cycle for the Mullet Rapper sometimes makes us a bit late...or a bit early for news. As I am writing this, Hurricane Irma is a category 5 storm and appears to be headed straight towards Florida. I remember the days before Hurricane Andrew in 1992 when we all knew the storm was powerful, but we did not know with certainty where it would go.

A few days before Andrew, Tim & I went to a Miami Dolphins preseason game, and at that game I mentioned to friends there that we should look around because things may not be the same during the next home game. Unfortunately, I was right. It is such an ominous feeling, knowing that something terrible may be about to happen and there is really nothing you can do about it but prepare as best vou can.

As a native south Floridian, I have been through the drill many times. Everything loose is brought in or tied down, including potted plants, outside furniture, boats, and yard

ornaments. What this has taught me is to have less of all of it, especially as I get older.

If have things you won't want to move or cannot, it may be

good idea not to have it, because by the time you read this article it may not be where you left it, it just may be in your neighbor's window!

A big part of hurricane preparation is doing the neighborly thing. If you leave things outside they can potentially become deadly projectiles in a storm. In our area if it is not blown away, chances are it will float away. When Wilma went through in 2005, our neighbor's boat in Chokoloskee was in ORA after the storm. Our other neighbor's manufactured home was gone, his Christmas ornaments were in our yard along with other people's clothing, checkbooks and household items. unbelievably sad.

A year or so after Andrew, Ken Dampier took us on a trip down to Lostman's. I remember seeing all green as we traveled through the Wilderness Waterway until we saw where Andrew cut through. It was a clear-cut swath of barren islands, no trees. It was as if a huge power-mower went through and cut everything down...it sent chills down my spine.

This is the same kind of feeling I had while watching the weather channel today. They show Irma hitting somewhere in Florida, maybe. They are saying there is not much in its way to slow it down. Our best hope is that the cold front from Canada gets south quick to deflect it into the Atlantic so that it becomes someone else's problem... which is still a problem.

Hopefully, we are all exhaling a big sigh of relief by the time you are reading this article...Hopefully, this is just another example of me being me...cautious and nervous, over-preparing for what may not even happen at all...we hope.

**** Recipes for Good Eating Originally from Delish.com 1 pan Chicken & Rice **INGREDIENTS** nonstick cooking spray 2 c. white rice, 1 onion, chopped 2 c. chicken broth, 2 cans cream of mushroom soup kosher salt, Freshly ground black pepper 3 large bone in, skin on chicken thighs or chicken breasts 2 tbsp. butter, melted, 2 tsp. thyme 1 garlic clove, finely minced, 1 tbsp. Chopped parsley **DIRECTIONS** Preheat oven to 350° and grease a 9"-x-13" baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Place rice and onion into baking pan. Pour in the broth and soup and stir to combine. Season with salt and pepper. Place chicken in rice mixture. Brush chicken with butter and sprinkle with thyme and garlic. Season with salt and pepper again. Cover dish with foil and bake for 1 hour. Uncover and bake for 30 minutes more, until the rice is cooked and the chicken is




golden. Top with the parsley and serve hot.

One of the most peculiar habits of the marsh rabbit is its tendency to let go with a strange, lizard-like squeal when startled. It is a bizarre sound coming from such an adorable little rabbit and when first encountered can readily surprise the unsuspecting naturalist.



Commonly seen eating grass and other vegetation along trails and roadways, the marsh rabbit is the bread and butter of many of Florida's predators, especially bobcats, hawks, and owls. Although a member of the cottontail family, the marsh rabbit does not have a fluffy white tail. It has smaller ears than the cottontail and prefers wetter environments. The marsh rabbit will actually swim across tidal passes to inhabit other barrier islands. It ranges all the way north to Virginia and west to Alabama.

The marsh rabbit is a strict herbivore and eats a wide variety of vegetation. It is a game animal in Florida, as it is in most of its range. Because a subspecies, *Sylvilagus palustris hefneri* (named after Hugh Hefner of *Playboy* fame), located in the lower Florida Keys, is endangered, the marsh rabbit is not hunted south of the Everglades.

It would be easy to think that the marsh rabbit is also prone to roadkill, but in fact it is rare to see one hit by an automobile. Like the white-tailed deer, the marsh rabbit appears to be adapting to the automobile. Its primary cause of mortality is predation, including being taken by alligators when swimming.

Author's Note: For anyone living or vacationing on Sanibel Island this summer, 2017, it is all but impossible not to make note of the fact that the current Marsh Rabbit population is at a peak. These population explosions, which run in various cycles, ultimately fall due to the increase of predators, which on Sanibel include bobcats and the recently arrived coyotes. After heavy predation the rabbit population will likely tumble, then, as a result of having fewer rabbits to prey upon, will soon thereafter cause the bobcat and coyote population to plummet, resulting in an increase in the rabbit population. Some believe this is a seven year cycle while others contend it is more of a ten year cycle. Either way, Sanibel could currently by called "Bunny Island" which has a nice ring to it.

TAXING THINGS by Mike the Tax Guy INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE UPDATES

Moving Expenses

Taxpayers may be able to deduct certain expenses

of moving to a new home because they started or changed job locations. Home means the taxpayer's main home. Eligible taxpayers can deduct the reasonable expenses of moving household goods and personal effects

and of traveling from the former home to the new home.

Reasonable expenses may include the cost of lodging while traveling to the new home. The unreimbursed cost of packing, shipping, storing

and insuring household goods in transit may also be deductible. **The move must closely relate to the start of work.** Generally, taxpayers can consider moving expenses within one year of the date they start work at a new job location.

The distance test. A new main job location must be at least 50 miles farther from the employee's former home than the previous job location. For example, if the old job was three miles from the old home, the new job must be at least 53 miles from the old home. A first job must be at least 50 miles from the employee's former home.

The time test. After the move, the employee must work full-time at the new job for at least 39 weeks in the first year. Those self-employed must work full-time at least 78 weeks during the first two years at the new job site.

Former FEMA Head Gives His Advice on Building or Rebuilding in Flood-Prone Areas

Craig Fugate, the easygoing Floridian who won broad praise for leading the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) under President Barack Obama, has some sharp opinions on what to do in the wake of Hurricane Harvey.

Here is an edited transcript of that conversation:

Q: What's life like since you left FEMA in January?

A: I'm doing a lot of advising, teaching and working with companies. I'm more focused on the resiliency (to disasters) and how to better prepare emergency managers and less about what will be a huge operation as this recovery (from Harvey) and all the private sector businesses. I'm already receiving calls from them. I'm like, "I'm not interested. Y'all have a nice day."

Q: Do you miss your old job?

A: If you're an emergency manager, you always tend to want to be in the thick of it. But my place is not there. That's (new FEMA Administrator) Brock's (Long) shop. It's his show and his team now. I can look back, and I can see things that we had started in our administration that they're doing now. I can see echoes of that. But I've tried to move on.

Q: How does Harvey affect the national debate in Congress about reforming the National Flood Insurance Program, which was already drowning in debt before the storm?

A: It may be the catalyst to get people to say, "Hey we need to stop growing the problem and figure out what we do with the existing policy holders." They were moving towards consensus before Harvey. Will they be able to get bipartisan agreement to move something through the House and the Senate, or do they need to do a short-term reauthorization to give them more time? And has Harvey introduced any new issues, because if they have to go back and get substantial borrowing authority, that's going to bring back on the fiscal conservative side the concern that this program is not actuarially sound, that it needs to be moved from one of subsidy to more where it pays for itself.

O: What would you like to see?

A: My simple suggestion is stop growing the problem. Why are we writing flood insurance (policies) for new construction in flood zones? Think about it: If you're going to build a new structure in the flood zone, the private sector can usure it. And if they can't insure it, then why is the public subsidizing that risk?

Q: So you think this is a problem we've exacerbated by rebuilding in flood-prone areas?

A: Why do we have to focus so much on building the capability to respond to these huge disasters when the fact is we're building and designing in a way that produces the disasters. Quit calling them natural disasters. They're just a disaster. They're only a disaster from a hazard like Harvey based upon how and where we built.

Q: Why have you been critical of groups representing homebuilders and Realtors for resisting such changes?

A: They're the biggest opponents to significant reform because it affects their ability to make money on transactions of building and selling homes that are high risk.

Q: You expect your former agency to get criticized no matter the response?

A: People are going to beat FEMA up over their temporary housing program. They're going to beat FEMA up and go, "Why don't you have better solutions?" And nobody's asking the question, "Well, why the hell did you build so many vulnerable houses in the first place?" There's no credible way to provide temporary housing to this type of scenario. We've got to quit figuring out how to respond better — that's still important — but we got to figure out how do we start reducing the impacts of disasters, particularly since our past history has been a poor indicator of the future risk.

Q: You think it was a mistake for President Donald Trump to rescind the 2015 executive order issued by Obama requiring federal agencies to develop new flood improvement standards?

A: Maybe there will be an opportunity to come back and replace it with something that may be a little bit more narrow than the original (order) but still keeps the intent that we should not be building stuff back to past (standards). We have to build for future risk. (Building) 1 foot above base elevation, it's still flooded in Harvey. Couple more feet, we probably could have saved more critical infrastructure or at least minimized the damages.

Sawfish News

by Tonya Wiley Antique Sawfish Rostra Yield Valuable DNA, Museum and Private Collections Aid Scientists



This summer was very exciting for scientists studying the DNA endangered sawfish. Kelcee Smith of Louisiana State University (LSU), Fearing Annmarie and Nicole Phillips of The University of Southern Mississippi (USM) collected tissue samples hundreds of old sawfish rostra (saws) held in public and private collections across the United States. During #SawSearch2017 (funded by

Save Our Seas Foundation and Haven Worth Consulting) samples were collected from 222 sawfish rostra in museums and homes along the eastern seaboard. The team travelled 2,405 miles, visited 10 states, to collect genetic samples from sawfish rostra which were originally collected during three centuries (1700s-1900s) and from several countries (USA, Mexico, Guatemala, Columbia, Nicaragua, Panama, Argentina, Brazil, Ecuador, Guyana, Suriname, French Guiana, Iran, Yemen, Madagascar, Java, Philippines, China, Papua New Guinea, Australia, India, Bangladesh, and New Guinea).

Sawfish are critically endangered, having suffered global declines in both range and abundance. Animal populations which undergo drastic declines in abundance are typically at risk of having reduced levels of genetic diversity and may be less 'fit', more susceptible to disease, and have a compromised ability to adapt to a changing environment. Very small populations also have an increased risk of inbreeding, which can lead to birth defects and unhealthy populations.

"The most direct way of quantifying any change in genetic diversity in sawfishes is to compare the levels of genetic diversity in contemporary populations to those from the past" explains Phillips. "Thankfully, old dried saws from sawfishes housed in public and private collections around the world contain the DNA of historic populations."

The long-term recovery of sawfishes is dependent upon populations being large and genetically diverse enough to adapt to changes in the environment, resist disease, and avoid inbreeding. If the levels of genetic diversity in contemporary populations are similar to those observed in historic sawfish populations, then the survival outlook for these animals may be good and recovery plans can focus on habitat restoration and protection. However, if the levels of genetic diversity in contemporary sawfish populations are substantially lower when compared to historic populations, then protecting the remaining genetic diversity should be a high priority for conservation and management plans.

To find sawfish rostra the researchers scour online databases, follow leads about sawfish rostra owned by the public, and contact curators at museums, educational centers, aquariums, universities, and other public institutions. Sawfish rostra are considered unique 'trophies' so many have been retained in both public and private collections. (Note: These antique rostra were collected prior to sawfish being listed under the Endangered Species Act. Now all sawfish species are protected in the US and the removal or sale of sawfish rostra is illegal.) "Sawfish saws are often preserved dry, meaning that viable DNA is still present in a 200 year old saw! This is pretty unique and we're trying to take advantage of the opportunity" says Smith.

Fearsome is the Fakahatchee

I'm curious to read how L.G. finally resolves his love life but also want to learn more about our environment.


