New Leadership Sworn in During December 5th Ceremony



December 5th marked the first official day for the leadership voted in by the residents of Everglades City in the November 28th election.

Above, City Clerk, Dottie Joiner (center), conducts the swearing in ceremony with the elected officials as shown left to right: Council Member Vicky Wells, Mayor Howie Grimm, (City Clerk Dottie Joiner), Elaine Middelstaedt, and Tim Smith, Sr. Mayor Howie Grimm was voted in overwhelmingly to continue as the permanent Mayor for the next two years after serving a two-and-a-half month term as Pro-Tem Mayor.

The group has vowed to get to work immediately as there are numerous issues the City is currently working on including hurricane damages to infrastructure and the on-going issues with the sewer and waste-water facility. Mayor Grimm also cited the roads as a key need spot.

This is no small task, and the citizens showed their concern by posting impressive voter turnout on election day.

We wish the newly elected, and re-elected, much success in tackling the "issues of the day" for our very special little town.

Volunteers Take to the Streets to Pick Up Remaining Hurricane Debris The Community Cleanup Effort Will Be Repeated Again in January

The weather did not cooperate on Saturday, but volunteers still came out to help cleanup some of the mess still leftover from Hurricane Irma. The goal was to begin at 8 a.m., but the rain did not let up until noon. The group reconvened at City Hall at noon, enjoyed a fantastic lunch provided by *Island Café*, and then took to the streets with bags, shovels, rakes and motivation! Newly elected City Council Member, Tim Smith, was one of the volunteers along with residents, Outward Bound participants and even a visitor (Pat) from Fort Myers!

On Sunday the weather was sunny and bright, but a bit windy and quite chilly. However, the turnout was excellent for the 8 a.m. start. Newly elected Mayor Howie Grimm joined the group along with several residents and folks from Outward Bound. At noon, the group took some time to enjoy the lunch provided by Island Café and then back to the streets to work until the 4 p.m. wrap up.



By the end of the weekend, there is a noticeable difference along the streets, in the medians and in front of homes. A big effort was made to find and dispose of a lot of the broken glass and other debris. Some shards of glass of 3 or 4 inches were found stuck in the mud. Please keep in mind there will still be some glass and nails that could not be uncovered so still use caution when letting children and pets play in the medians.

Prizes were awarded each day that were donated from our local businesses and organizations; Grimm's Stone Crabs donated two 2-pound bags (with mustard sauce), Right Choice Supermarket donated a bottle of wine on each day, and the Lion's Club donated

Area Weather Observer Needed!

The National Weather Service is Looking For A New Official Weather **Observer in Everglades City!**

The National Weather Service Miami is seeking a new official weather observer in Everglades City. The Cooperative Observer



Program has been around for 120 years approximately 10,000 observers in the United States, and there has been an observer in Everglades City on and off since 1926.

Rainfall and temperature data collected is used to determine federal disaster declarations for federal aid. The data is also used by the insurance industry to settle claims, energy companies to determine energy costs, local officials to make water decisions, resource and education institutions to study climate. If you have a passion for weather and can dedicate a couple minutes each morning, we'd love to hear from you! Most of our observers across south Florida are retirees, farmers, or individuals that just love weather.

So what exactly would the observer need to do? We're looking for someone to take rainfall measurements each morning at 7am and report any amount into our website. The rain gauge would be provided and maintained by the National Weather Service. We just need a suitable spot in your yard to place the small rain gauge. We operate 365 days a year at the Weather Service so we would need the person to be able to report each morning, or be able to have a friend or family member report for them if you are going out of town or unable to report for any reason.

My Little Slice of Paradise By Kathy Brock

Grow it and they will come... 2nd Annual Plant Sale Has Been Rescheduled!

The Mullet Rapper will hold the second annual "plant" sale fundraiser on January 13th from 9 am to 1 pm in Everglades City. Last year we featured orchids, but Hurricane Irma did not like that plan, apparently...so this year we will have all types plants and seeds! Palms, herbs, flowers, vegetables and native plants for hummingbirds and butterflies will be our primary categories.

Of course, we may have some orchids, but not the diverse selection we were so fortunate to have last year. Here are some of the plant varieties that will be available for sale:

Milkweed: We have starts and seeds for both orange and yellow varieties. Milkweed is the host plant for monarch and queen butterflies.

Candlestick Cassia: This beautiful flowering shrub (yellow flowers) is the host plant for butterflies in the Sulphur family and some "whites".

Passiflora Edulis: This passion vine grows fast, produces beautiful flowers, and produces edible fruit. It is also the host for the gulf fritillary butterfly, zebra longwing and Julia butterfly.

Garlic Chives: These are super-easy to grow, great with eggs and potatoes and even survived the storm surge! Best of all, they will easily grow in a container on a porch for easy retrieval.

Super-sweet 100's: These small cherry-type tomatoes are very prolific and delicious! They can be planted in the ground or container grown.

Lemon Grass: This "grass" is a perfect compliment to chicken and used in many oriental dishes. Some claim that it is also a mosquito repelling plant. I prefer it in tea to lemons. Easy to grow is the key here.

Dill: If you eat fish, dill is a great herb to have. Sauté fish in butter with dill and you will know why. This easy herb will seed in spring and the seeds can be used in cooking too or for next year's crop.

Crown of Thorns: This year-round blooming plant is great on a patio where it gives you color without drying out too quickly in between watering. We should have multiple colors to choose from.

Bromeliads: Bromeliads add beauty to any landscape. We will have a couple of different varieties.

We will also have seeds from various types of herbs and veggies that can be planted next fall for your enjoyment next winter! All veggie seeds are organic and grown in our own neighborhood!

We Are Accepting Crafts, Plant Donations & Pots 100% of All Sales Proceeds Will Be Given to the **Everglades City School Athletic Department**

If you have potted plants or empty plant pots you do not want anymore, I will gladly pick them up and sell them in the fundraiser. 100% of the proceeds is donated to the school, so even if it is small or not that spectacular, we can find a new home for it! We are also looking for local art and crafts to add to our fundraiser, so contact us if you have something to contribute. Contributions should be made by January 6th so that they can be prepped for the event.

*********** Recipes for Good Eating By Kathy Brock **Cheesy Scalloped Potatoes** Ingredients 3 lbs. Yukon gold potatoes, sliced thin 1 1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese 1 medium onion diced finely 1 can of evaporated milk 1/2 cup flour 1 stick butter (or margarine) Salt, pepper, garlic powder to taste Directions: Peel potatoes and slice thinly using a food processor (or cutting by hand). Dice onion and set aside. In a 5 quart casserole: Grease sides of casserole with some of the butter. Next, layer by adding potatoes, some of the onion, shredded cheese, sprinkle flour and season with salt (not too much), pepper and some garlic. The garlic is optional. Repeat this layering until all of the potatoes are used up. On the top, use the remaining cheese and onion. Add the can of evaporated milk and cover with foil or the casserole cover. Bake at 350° for 1 1/2 hours or until potatoes come out fork tender. You can also microwave this dish on high for about 30 minutes using a glass lid (no foil). Note that it can bubble over so use a good deep pan and leave room at the top so it minimizes this. These potatoes are great for several days after cooking.

SAWFISH NEWS by Tonya Wiley of Havenworth Coastal Conservation


Their odd appearance and awesome size made them a prized catch for recreational fishermen. Their unique elongated, blade-like snouts, studded with teeth on both sides, were often kept as trophies. Net fishermen on the other hand considered them a nuisance because of the damage they would cause to their gear.


Two species of sawfish were once found in the US: the largetooth sawfish, *Pristis pristis*, and the smalltooth sawfish, *Pristis pectinata*. The largetooth sawfish was found throughout the Gulf of Mexico but was more common in western Gulf waters of Texas and Mexico. The smalltooth sawfish ranged from Texas to New York and was most plentiful in the eastern Gulf waters of Florida. Both sawfish species were considered "abundant" and "common" in the early 1900's. Numerous postcards, photographs, and newspaper articles from that era bear the scene of fishermen hauling in countless sawfish to boats, docks, and beaches across the country.

Unfortunately, the largetooth sawfish has not been seen in the United States since the last confirmed record in 1943. The smalltooth sawfish has fared better and still remains in US waters, though at greatly reduced numbers and geographic range. Today the smalltooth sawfish is found predominately in southwest Florida, notably including Everglades National Park (ENP). The vast

expanse of natural habitat within ENP, and limited fishing pressure, likely served as a refuge for sawfish as the population was under constant pressure.

What happened to these grand fish? What caused them to vanish from much of our coastal waters? The decline was due to a combination of three primary factors: (1) overfishing, (2) low reproductive potential, and (3) habitat loss.





Born at about 2 feet in length, juvenile sawfish rely on very shallow, coastal and estuarine waters close to shore for safety from predators, such as sharks, during the first years of their life. However, these shallow coastal waters are the same areas that have been converted to waterfront development. Now much of the natural shoreline vegetation has been developed into seawalls, beaches, marinas, roads, canals, and docks. Therefore the natural vegetation and shallow habitats previously used by sawfish as important protective nursery areas have been greatly reduced in quantity and all but eliminated in some areas.

Due to the dramatic decline of the sawfish populations, The Ocean Conservancy petitioned National Marine Fisheries Service in 1999 to protect both species under the Endangered Species Act (ESA). The smalltooth sawfish was classified as Endangered in 2003, making it the first fully marine fish and first elasmobranch (sharks, skates, and rays) protected by the ESA. The largetooth sawfish was listed as Endangered in 2011.

One of the best methods of monitoring the population as it recovers is the use of public sawfish encounters. If you catch or see a sawfish take a quick photograph of it, estimate its size, note your location, and share the information with scientists. The details of your sightings or catches help to track recovery progress. You can share your information by calling 1-844-4-SAWFISH (1-844-472-9347) or emailing sawfish@myfwc.com. Information about historic catches or the location of any old sawfish saws is also appreciated.

Remember, due to their protected status it is illegal to target, harm, harass, or handle sawfish in any way. While it is technically illegal to catch a sawfish (except with a research permit or in a fishery where incidental take has been authorized) captures do occur while fishing for other species. Any sawfish caught while fishing must be released as quickly as possible. The number one rule to remember when handling and releasing a sawfish is to leave it in the water at all times. Do not lift it out of the water on to your boat or a pier, and do not drag it on shore.



The striped mullet once formed the backbone of the Southwest Florida fishing industry. Before the regulation changes that banned the use of gill nets in 1994 there were hundreds of mullet boats working the inshore and near-shore waters of the Gulf. Most of these boats were not interested in the mullet for their meat, but for their roe, which could fetch as much as one-hundred dollars a pound in Japanese fish markets.

Even after the net ban the demand for the roe continued and roe fisherman, using high-speed boats and mullet cast nets, would come into Florida from as far away as south Texas to harvest mullet roe for the Asian markets. There were so many mullet fisherman plying the waters in and around Sanibel and Captiva that the State of Florida stopped issuing permits to harvest mullet to out of state anglers in the early 2000s. On a good night's catch, a skilled mullet cast netter can make more than \$1,000 from the sale of the valuable roe. The fish itself was sold as bait or for use as fish meal.



Mullet eat zooplankton, bottom dwelling organisms and detritus. They consume vast amounts of marine algae and plant waste. They are the grazers of Southwest Florida and form the basis of the food

chain in large part created by the falling leaves and detritus of the red mangrove. While the smaller finger mullets (juveniles) are consumed by ladyfish, jacks and a host of other predators, the adult mullet are a favorite target of bottlenose dolphin, sharks, large snook, mackerel and cobia.

A fascinating aspect of the striped mullet is the fact that they jump. These leaping mullet are the fish most often seen in Ding Darling. While some people claim that they jump to escape predators, studies have indicated that this is not the case. Other theories involved the removal of parasites from the gills of jumping mullet but that too has not been verified. A more recent theory is that mullet jump to somehow obtain oxygen from the air. The trouble with this theory is that there does not appear to be any physiological mechanism in the fish that would allow it to take in this oxygen. The last theory is that mullet jump simply for the fun of it.

The truth is that no one has yet to be able to explain why mullet jump. They do jump however and generally clear the water by at least a foot, tending to jump in patterns of three consecutive leaps. I have had several striped mullet jump into my jon-boat, with one rather large one hitting me in the chest.

For food, mullet are best smoked as they have an earthy taste similar to freshwater suckers or carp. Being almost entirely herbivores they are nearly impossible to catch on hook and line. Some people claim you can catch them using frozen corn kernels but the thought of baiting a hook with corn seems silly. The best method of catching them is by throwing a special, wide meshed cast net aptly called "a mullet net." Regular baitfish can swim through it because its mesh is very large and the sinkers used along the perimeter of the net are heavy, causing the net to sink quickly.

Cut mullet is a favorite for tarpon fisherman in the spring and can also be used for shark, cobia and bottom fishing. Mullet fishing is still a viable commercial activity along the west coast of Florida, though not at the same level of harvest it was before the net ban of 1994.

Old Tamiami Trail Modifications Environmental Assessment Available for Review

The National Park Service (NPS), in cooperation with the Jacksonville District of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE), announces the release of the Old Tamiami Trail Modifications Environmental Assessment (EA). The EA is available for review and comment at the NPS website http://parkplanning.nps.gov/OTT.

This EA evaluates options for modifying an original 5.7-mile segment of Old Tamiami Trail located along the northern boundary of Everglades National Park (the park) as proposed in the USACE Central Everglades Planning Project (CEPP) Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) in 2014. The purpose of the Old Tamiami Trail Modifications Project is to enhance sheet flow from Water Conservation Area (WCA) 3A into the park's Shark River Slough via the S-12C and S-12D water control structures, as envisioned in the CEPP. The purpose is also to enhance the natural resources of the park and WCA 3A by improving marsh connectivity and wetland functioning.

The EA evaluates two action alternatives, describes the environment that would be affected by the alternatives, and assesses the environmental consequences of implementing the alternatives.

Alternative 1 would remove 4.0 miles of the 5.7-mile roadway and modify the adjacent canal to connect it to the Everglades. A 1.7-mile segment of roadway would be retained, cleared of vegetation, and made available for visitor use and interpretation of the role of Old Tamiami Trail in South Florida's transportation history.

The NPS proposed action, **Alternative 2**, would remove 5.45 miles of the roadway and modify the adjacent canal to connect it to the Everglades. A 0.25-mile segment of roadway would be retained, cleared of vegetation, and made available for visitor use and interpretation of Old Tamiami Trail's role in South Florida's transportation history.

Under both alternatives, the retained segment would be adjacent to, and accessible from, the park's Shark Valley Entrance. The EA also evaluates the impacts of a no-action alternative, which would not alter the 5.7-mile segment of the Old Tamiami Trail.



The celebration will continues on **Sunday**,




