Congratulations Class of 2018 Valedictorian Ashlyn Goff (some content from NaplesNews.com)



Hurricane Irma affected everyone in Southwest Florida to some degree, but perhaps nowhere more than Everglades City.

Dealing with that and the aftermath was just another challenge for Ashlyn Goff, Everglades City School's Winged Foot Scholar-Athlete Award finalist.

Goff played four varsity sports -- two of them in the same seasons -- and was unrelenting, whether that meant doing a cross country meet or practice, going to school and then doing the same for volleyball, for example.

Or after Irma, when that meant she had to go to Golden Gate High School to train with its cross country team because Everglades City School was still closed due to the damage, then drive to Manatee Middle School, where the students were going, go to school and then do volleyball. "It started to overlap real bad," she said.

On top of that, Goff was a full-time student at Florida Southwestern State College, during her senior year, completing 24 college credit hours.

"Ashlyn is a rare student-athlete, one that only comes along once in a while if the school is fortunate enough," wrote Rebecca Welch, the volleyball, boys basketball and baseball coach at Everglades City School..

"Ashlyn is the apotheosis of a scholar-athlete: striving for personal perfection but never forgetting she is part of a team," social studies teacher Carey Walker wrote in a recommendation letter.

"You learn to manage your time wisely," Goff, an eighth generation native, said in an understatement.

Goff kept doing it wisely, enough where she's already put in the required time to get her captain's license and is planning to enter the U.S. Coast Guard.

"Once she makes the commitment, she will be the first female (to the best of my knowledge) to join any military pursuit in the 39 years that I have taught and coached at Everglades City School," Welch wrote.

Goff is hoping to make a career out of the Coast Guard, but not her only one. "I want to do 20 years in the Coast Guard, retire, and then I want to start a second career," she said.

Goff will leave for two months of training in July in Cape May, New Jersey. When she officially enters the Coast Guard. Goff also plans on attending college so she can become an officer.

Ashlyn Goff seems to have it all planned out but for one thing - the second career. "I'm not sure yet," she said.

Editor's note: One thing that I am certain of is that Ashlyn Goff will achieve the goals she sets for herself. From a very young age, she has been determined, focused and driven. She has toughness and determination and compassion. She showed such care to my father in his final years. I thank her for that!

She is a very rare individual. She is an excellent role model for current and future students at the school. I am very proud

of Ashlyn, we are all very proud of Ashlyn, and look forward to following her adventures as a member of the U.S. Coast Guard...and whatever else she chooses to pursue and then master.

Here's to Your Health

7 Tips to Keep You Healthy During the Summer Months



Summer is almost here, and the temperature is steadily increasing every day, sending off warning bells to everyone to start taking precautions for the summer heat.

While you can't control the temperature outside, you can take some steps to make sure you do not suffer any serious health issues due to the

Young children, the elderly and those with underlying health problems are the most susceptible to heat related problems. Excessive heat can drain you of your energy, making you prone to infections, vomiting, nausea,

prickly heat and low blood pressure. Here are some important, and easy to follow, precautionary steps from *food.ndtv.com* that can help you stave off any heat-related problems:

- 1. Hydrate and Hydrate: Consider this as the number one rule. Staying hydrated is very crucial during summer as it ensures that your body keeps functioning normally. As the heat goes up, it results in excessive sweating, which also reduces energy levels and electrolytes from your body. * Sip on flavored water by adding in mineral rich fruits like watermelon, lemon, kiwi, etc., or make slushies and lemonades at home.
- 2. Eat Regularly But Eat Light: Summer time tends to reduce one's appetite because of the excessive heat. But it is important for you to eat regularly because your body requires the nutrients to fight the heat and keep you healthy. Having said so, the best thing to do is to follow a light diet including summer veggies like squash, salads, fruits and veggies. You should also watch your salt intake.
- * 3. Cold Water Showers: One of the quickest ways to cool down is to step into a cold water 🌞 shower. It will instantly make you feel refreshed. Also try washing your feet and face with cold 🍲 iwater before you go to sleep. It is said that placing an ice pack on your neck can work wonders too to cut down body temperature. Even wiping yourself with wet towels can help if you are . feeling over-heated.
- **4. Switch off Those Lights:** Too many lights in the room tend to heat up the temperature. Some TV's also put off heat. Switch off as many lights and heat producing appliances as you can during the heat of the day, and only use the ones you really need. Keep your curtains or blinds right closed to block incoming sun and double check the insultation around doors and windows.
- 5. Stay Indoors During the Heat of the Day: Keep a check on weather forecast. This is important because you can then track the hottest point of the day and plan accordingly. If you love walking, try to do so only in the early hours or after sun down. Make sure to protect yourself from mosquitoes as these are the times of the day they are most active too!
 - 6. Wear Loose Clothes: Needless to say, to stay cool you need to wear loose clothes so that there is good air circulation. Ditch your synthetic dresses and trousers and stick to cotton. Even if you are out fishing or enjoying another outdoor activity, long sleeves protect you from the sun (and the bugs!).
- 7. Don't Over Exert Yourself: Physical activity is essential for good health, but during the summer months, and periods of high heat & humidity, make sure that you don't over exert yourself. It is vital to stay hydrated during any activity and to be aware of signs of heat stroke. If you feel faint or nauseated, ask for help immediately and call 911 for help!

If someone is experiencing heat exhaustion, call 911 and take these steps:

Move the person out of the heat and into a shady or air-conditioned place. Lay the person down and elevate the legs and feet slightly. Remove tight or heavy clothing.

Have the person drink cool water or other nonalcoholic beverage without caffeine.





Big Rains Mean BIG Toads...and Some of Them Are Nasty!

From the Conservancy of Southwest Florida

Early spring months bring a re-emergence of cane toads to Southwest Florida. While these invasive amphibians can breed any time of the year, they tend to show themselves most during the evenings of spring and summer.

Native to South America, the cane toad was originally introduced to Florida in the 1930's and 40's in a misguided attempt to control agricultural pests in sugar cane fields. In the years following, the pet trade also contributed with its share of releases and escapees during the 1950's and 60's. Regardless of the origin however, these animals, unfortunately, are here to stay.

Cane toads have a big appetite and are capable of eating just about anything they can fit into their mouths and it's quite likely that this insatiable hunger is what made them an attractive choice for pest control to begin with. Unfortunately, that very trait is now posing a threat to our native wildlife, and also results in them being attracted to our homes when pet food/feces or garbage is left out. It is not uncommon to see one eating right out of the dog food bowl left on a porch. This increases the risk for a toad-pet interaction.



Cane toads are not aggressive, but they have enlarged paratoid glands on their neck and shoulder region that produce a bufotoxin, that when ingested, is highly toxic. This substance is released as a defense mechanism that can severely injure or even kill an animal that licks or bites them – including dogs, cats and other pets.







Gag Grouper Season Opened June 1. New Rules Require Registration With FWC

Gag grouper will open for recreational harvest in most state Gulf of Mexico waters and all federal Gulf waters June 1, and will remain open through Dec. 31.

Franklin, Wakulla, Taylor and Jefferson counties are excluded from this opening because they have their own season from April 1-June 30 and Sept. 1-Dec. 31. Monroe County is also excluded from this season because it follows the Atlantic state season.



Gulf state waters are from shore to 9 nautical miles. Federal waters begin where state waters end and extend to 200 nautical miles.

The minimum size limit for gag grouper in Gulf waters is 24 inches total length, and the daily bag limit is two fish per person within the four-grouper per person aggregate limit.

If you plan to fish for gag grouper in Gulf state or federal waters from a private recreational vessel,

you must sign up

as a Gulf Reef Fish Angler (annual renewal is required). To learn more, visit MyFWC.com/Fishing and click on "Saltwater Fishing," "Recreational Regulations" and "Gulf Reef Fish Survey" under "Reef Fish." Sign up today at GoOutdoorsFlorida.com.

State for-hire operators that do not have a federal reef fish permit and plan to target gag in state waters must have the <u>State Gulf Reef Fish Charter</u> designation on their license. Harns Marsh - Home to Many Birds on a Birders' Bucket List

Harns Marsh, a storm-water retention facility located at headwaters of the Orange River in Lehigh Acres, is an unlikely destination for naturalists and birders. It is not included in the South Florida Birding Trail, though no one has informed the countless birds that frequent this large freshwater marsh of that It offers omission. no amenities, no interpretive center, not even any signs directing visitors to marsh. Now under the



jurisdiction of the East County Water Control District, Harns Marsh is slated to become a Lee County regional park, which will bring restrooms, picnic tables, and other amenities to this undiscovered treasure.

The site is roughly one square mile (578 acres). In 2007, some 182 acres along the north marsh were dredged and cleared of invasive plants, which improved water quality and wildlife viewing. Hiking and bicycling, but no motorized vehicles, are

allowed on the four-mile sandy impoundment road encircling the marsh.



Scores of birds, snakes, snails, and small mammals found here. Two of particular species interest are the snail kite (aka the Everglades kite) and the limpkin. Birders who might spend years trying to catch a glimpse of either of these species can cut their search short with a single visit to Harns Marsh. These hard-to-find birds are attracted by the tens of thousands of snails

that live in the marsh, including both the native apple snail and the invasive island apple snail. The island apple snail (*Pomacea insularum*) is from South America and has, through accidental releases, invaded many of Florida's freshwater marshes. These enormous snails, many as large as a small apple, litter the edge of the marsh. Snail kites and limpkins are adapting to dining on these foreigners, which have also become an important source of food for turtles, great blue herons, alligators, and other animals.

Other sightings at Harns Marsh, especially during the winter months, might include redwing blackbirds, cowbirds, various migratory duck species, and sparrows. Sightings of sandhill cranes are common along the western edge of the marsh. Visiting the marsh is best just after dawn and before sunset. Be sure to bring bug spray and a hat, since areas of shade are in short supply. Harns Marsh is an undiscovered treasure in Lee County that hopefully, once made into a park, will get the recognition it deserves.

Fishing in the 10,000 Islands by Capt. Mike Merritt

Well, May turned out to be almost as windy as April. Now, we are getting lots of rain, so summer is officially here!

I know it's hot but I love the summer fishing. The years we have had lots of rain seem to coincide with good Snook fishing. I guess it helps with the spawn. So, the Snook should have a good year!

Summer is the time I really like top water in the morning, and again in the evening. Big Snook will patrol the beaches so fishing the troughs with top water lures is a great way to start the day! There will be fish moving into the rivers too, so the river mouths will hold fish.

Live bait should also be around but you may have to



venture further out as the water gets more brackish coming out of the rivers. Greenies and Pilchards are hard to beat for some great snook action. I am looking forward to lots of big fish this summer!

Catching Reds and Seatrout is still possible all summer too. The Seatrout tend to get smaller in the hotter months. Popping corks rigged with a 1/2oz. DOA glow shrimp is a sure way to get the biggest ones.

Reds are sporadic in the summer but we do get on some good bites. Jigs tipped with shrimp will produce, and will also get you some Snook action. Live bait or cut bait in your favorite spot is a good way to go also. Reds love to feed off the bottom so always keep this in mind when you are targeting them.

Tarpon will be around all summer long and you should be able to see rolling fish this time of year. Smaller Tarpon can be caught in the back country all the way up in the fresh water areas.

Of course, this is a great time to venture out offshore with calmer winds. Just keep an eye on the afternoon thunderstorms and plan your trip accordingly. It's no fun being caught offshore in a lightning storm. Always err on the side of caution.

Whatever you choose this summer, it should be action packed and pleasant fishing so get out and enjoy less boats on the water!

Professors, NOAA Come to Area, Hold Workshop About Sea Level Rise

Professors from University of Florida, University of Miami, University of San Diego, and Florida Gulf Coast University joined experts from NOAA to hold a workshop regarding sea level rise and how it may affect Collier County in the coming decades.

Council Member, Elaine Middelstaedt and resident Kathy Brock attended the roundtable to listen to the experts and learn what will be done in the next few years to deal with flooding and other issues that may be of concern.

The group of professors and NOAA experts visited our area on Tuesday May 22, and were given a tour by Kathy Brock. They were most interested in the damage in the area from Hurricane Irma and the storm surge that caused so much flood damage.

The data they collect is used in a computer model (called ACUNE) that they are developing for Collier County. Included in the model is data dating back over 20 years. They use this information to predict future flooding, and any changes associated with projected sea level rise.

The study they are conducting is isolated to Collier County at this time. This information will be used by the county for future land development, building codes and planning. Kudos to Collier County for being forward thinking and proactive!

When the model is complete, it can be used for other counties/areas who are interested in this type of planning for the future.

The diverse group of professionals each focus on their particular area of expertise in this project. Ranging from how it may impact the economics of an area to what it may mean for the future land development code is analyzed.

We thank the group for including Everglades City in the ACUNE study.

First Named Storm of Season Batters Southeast, Takes 2 Lives

Sub-Tropical Storm Alberto, the first named storm of the hurricane season, made landfall on Florida's Panhandle on the afternoon of May 28th, washing out the unofficial start of summer.

As it made its way north, the storm brought rain and wind to the southwest coast throwing a wet blanket on the Memorial Day long weekend.

In Polk County, North Carolina, two television journalists were killed when a tree fell on their vehicle, state Trooper Rico Stephens said. Their station, NBC affiliate WYFF of Greenville, South Carolina, identified them as anchor Mike McCormick and photographer Aaron Smeltzer.

"All of us at WYFF News 4 are grieving," the station said in a tweet. "We are a family." Tryon Fire Chief Geoff Tennant added that he'd done an interview with McCormick shortly before his death.

"We had talked a little bit about how he wanted us to stay safe and how we wanted him to stay safe," Tyron told reporters. "Of course, 10, 15 minutes later we get the call and it was him and his photographer."

Polk County warned in a Facebook post that the area where the incident occurred — just north of the South Carolina state line — had become dangerous and more flash flooding was possible through Wednesday.

Forecasters warned of life-threatening surf conditions and the possibility of a few brief tornadoes in much of Florida and parts of Georgia, South Carolina and Alabama. It said heavy rains were also expected, giving coastal residents a taste of what forecasters recently predicted would be an active hurricane season.

With the official start of hurricane season only three weeks away, now is the time for everyone to make any necessary hurricane season preparations and review personal evacuation plans.


