FALL IS IN THE AIR...CRAB SEASON IS ALMOST HERE! The Annual Blessing of the Fleet Celebration is on September 28th



We love Septembers in the Everglades area. Yes, the weather is hot. But when September comes, the fishing is hot too. Anglers are catching Snook, and crabbers are getting ready. The commercial docks are busy this time of year as the captains prepare their boats and their crew for the crab season ahead.

At all times of the day, and sometimes night, you can hear the crews working and preparing their traps. At this time of year we are all feeling hopeful. The crab season ahead may be a good one.

No one really knows, but the buzz about town is all positive. The tourist season should be strong. Our water is clean and our towns are ready.

We are two years removed from Hurricane Irma and the area has bounced back. I'd say "all the way back" but there are still a handful of people still working on getting their new homes built, so I will save that statement for next year. But this year, it'll be different.

We have some new buildings, and new businesses getting ready to open this season. We still have the most amazing sunsets on a nightly basis. We are still one of the best kept secrets in all of Florida...but the stone crab is not a secret. It is a highly sought after delicacy.

Did you know that The Florida stone crab (Menippe mercenaria). is found in the western North Atlantic, from Connecticut to Belize, including Texas, the Gulf of Mexico, Cuba, The Bahamas, and the East Coast of the United States? The stone crab can also be found in and around the salt marshes of South Carolina and Georgia.



Stone Crabs eat oysters and other mollusks, carrion, sea grass and other crustaceans. Females reach maturity after about two years. According to the FWC website, Females are only able to mate immediately after a molt, or when the crab sheds its smaller shell, while their shells (exoskeletons) are soft. Female molting and mating occurs in the fall (mostly September through November). Females retain the sperm received during the fall mating season for up to a year, or until the next season's molt. Sperm is stored in two sacs over the winter and used

during the following spring and summer spawning season to fertilize the eggs of each sponge.

It is not legal to harvest a female carrying eggs. Females carrying eggs are to be returned to the water unharmed. Egg sponges can be orange (see above) or brown.

Stone Crabs are sold from October 15 to May 15.



A Message From Fire Chief



Kingman Schuldt September 11th is officially recognized as Patriot Day,

and is remembered globally

as the anniversary of the

catastrophic terrorist attacks on the United September 11, States of 2001.

Today, 18 years later and a generation ago, many not old enough to remember the attacks while even today dozens of first responders continue to lose their battle from illnesses associated with the attacks.



On that day 2,977 people lost their lives; victims on the four planes, 2,606 in New York City in the World Trade Center and on the ground, and 125 at

the Pentagon. These included 55 military personnel, 343 firefighters, 60 police officers, 8 Emergency Medical Technicians and 3 Court Officers who all sacrificed their lives in the face of a cowardly enemy who so savagely attacked thousands of incident victims, leaving thousands without mothers and fathers, sister and brothers, children, parents and loved ones.

There were 75 Fire Department of New York (FDNY) firehouses in which at least one member was killed. The FDNY also lost its department chief, first deputy commissioner, one of its marshals, one of its chaplains, as well as other administrative or specialty personnel.

121 engine companies, 62 ladder companies and 27 fire officers were deployed to the World Trade Center. All off -duty firefighters were recalled — the first time the FDNY had issued a total recall in over 30 years. In addition to the regular fire apparatus, and personnel assigned to the incident, the FDNY also deployed its only Haz-Mat unit, its mobile command center, its field communications unit, all five rescue units and high-rise units, six of its seven squad units, and one of its two tactical support units.

And so, to all who so selflessly gave their lives for the good of their fellow man and woman on September 11, 2001, with their tasks completed, their duties well done, their loved ones left behind, their last alarm sounded, let's always remember those who protect your freedoms each day, and those who lost their lives on September 11, 2001; firefighters, law enforcement, servicemen and civilians. Never take your security and safety for granted, appreciate the men and women in uniform, your parents and family, as you enjoy the freedoms of the United States of America.

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FLORIDA DEER SEASON OPENS WITH NEW ANNUAL BAG LIMIT

The 2019-2020 hunting season is already underway in south Florida's Zone A and will soon be opening in the other three hunting zones. This season, there are new statewide rule changes that hunters need to understand, especially when it comes to hunting deer.

NEW ANNUAL BAG LIMIT ON DEER

"There is now a five-deer annual bag limit, of which no more than two may be antlerless. This applies to all hunters and is the maximum number of deer that any one hunter may take in the state throughout the entire deer hunting season," said Cory Morea, FWC biologist and deer management program coordinator.

Deer harvested on licensed game farms/hunting preserves and those taken through the deer depredation program, private lands deer management program, and antlerless deer program permits do not count as part of a hunter's five-deer annual bag limit. However, antlerless deer taken on wildlife management areas using antlerless deer quota permits/ tags do count toward a hunter's five deer (of which two may be antlerless) annual bag limit. "This annual bag limit was developed through extensive collaboration with staff and stakeholders and aligns with the goals and objectives outlined in our Commission-approved strategic plan for deer management," Morea said. "It is intended to improve hunting opportunities by encouraging harvest among more hunters as well as greater selectivity while helping maintain a healthy and reasonably balanced deer herd."

Until now, Florida was the only state in the Southeast without a specified annual bag

NEW HARVEST REPORTING REQUIREMENT FOR DEER HUNTERS

All hunters, regardless of age or license requirement, must now log their harvested deer prior to moving the deer from the point where the hunter located it. They can do so using the new FWC Deer Harvest Reporting App or a paper deer harvest log.

The app is called "Survey123 for ArcGIS" and can be downloaded for free onto a mobile device, such as a smartphone or tablet, from the Apple App Store, Google Play Store or Amazon AppStore. At MyFWC.com/HarvestReport, hunters can learn how to find and download the app and install the FWC Deer Harvest Report Form. In addition, there's a separate set of instructions for using the app. Once a hunter inputs the required data in the app and successfully submits the harvest record, a confirmation number will be saved in the hunter's "sent" folder within the app, and the log/reporting process is complete. If no cell service or Wi-Fi is available, the harvest record will be saved in the "outbox" folder and the hunter may send the report once service is available.

If hunters do not have a mobile device or, if hunters prefer, they may choose to log their harvest on a paper deer harvest log. The FWC provides a courtesy deer harvest log that hunters can print from MyFWC.com/HarvestReport. If hunters use a paper harvest log, they will need to report their harvest by either calling the toll-free Deer Harvest Reporting Hotline at 844-392-DEER (3337) between 8 a.m. – 8 p.m. ET or by using the FWC Deer Harvest Reporting App. A confirmation number will be given once successful submission is completed, and hunters must write that number on their paper harvest log to complete the harvest reporting process.

The reporting step must be done within 24 hours of harvest, before final processing of the deer, before any of the deer is transferred to a meat processor or taxidermist, or before leaving the state with the deer.

Deer harvested on licensed game farms/hunting preserves or those possessed that were killed by motor vehicles do not have to be reported.

"When hunting deer, hunters are encouraged to keep their harvest log or mobile device with them to avoid delays in moving their harvested deer," Morea said.

Having an FWC customer ID number is helpful when reporting a harvested deer. Hunters exempt from license requirements who do not have a customer ID number can obtain one by going to GoOutdoorsFlorida.com and clicking "Create Customer Account" before going hunting.

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My Little Slice of Paradise by Kathy Brock

September 21 was my fathers birthday. I am thinking about him because it is the date of this edition of the Mullet Rapper.

My father passed away in March 2016 at the age of 92. My mom died many years earlier in 1994 at the age of 70. I never felt that I got to know her as an adult, she was gone way too soon. That was not the case with my father. We knew each other very, very well.

It is hard to believe he has been gone three years now. I recall when he died how empty it felt to be without a living parent. Even though I was well into my 50's, I felt like an orphan.

The daily phone calls and conversations we once had were no more.

The ability to bounce ideas off of him was no longer an option.

Making a meal and having him gush over it would never happen again in my time left on earth. Life would never be the same again. I was an orphan.

March 18, 2016 marked the day when my "new normal" began. I had been independent my entire life, but somehow losing my father made me feel a bit like a ship without a rudder for awhile.

We were close when I was a child, and even closer as time passed. My life with Tim was intertwined with Dad as he started living with us in 1995.

Dad taught us as a couple how to do so many things. Building stuff. Repairing things. Puttering around in the yard, FISHING and BOATING. These are all things I/we learned from Dad.

He came from an era, and from a family that did things for themselves. Calling a handyman was not an option. If something broke, you figured out how to fix it and that was before Google and YouTube videos!

Dad would've loved the "how to" videos on YouTube. That was him all the way. He was super stubborn, yet understanding. He was very, very intelligent. As he aged, electronics frustrated him. He was never much of an "inside the house" person anyway. His life, like mine, is enjoyed outdoors.

We used to marvel at how some of our neighbors (on the East Coast) spent so little time outdoors. Every day we did something outside. Then, on the weekends, we would find ways to spend even more time outside.

I recall fishing in the 60's & 70's with my dad. I loved going on the boat with Dad and older brother. I was the dedicated driver as the guys manned the trolling rods...ready to act when the big hits happened. Before we would go in for the day, Dad would stop at the reefs so I could make some easy catches. Snapper, grunt, and grouper were so plentiful. Those were the days.

Looking back I feel so fortunate that my parents exposed us to so many of nature's wonders. They invested time into showing us as much as possible. My father used to say it was important to be well rounded. He stressed that having a wide knowledgebase is paramount to being independent.

My parents raised two very independent children. My brother was the more studious child, I was more of a rebel and was responsible for most of the parental headaches.

We had two caring and involved parents at home who engaged with their kids. Thanks Mom & Dad. Yes. Those were the days...

Island Life Recipes Barley Salad By Kathy Brock

\$\frac{1}{2} 3 cups cooked barley (al dente)
\$\frac{1}{2} 1 cup finely chopped celery
\$\frac{1}{2} 1 cup finely chopped carrot
\$\frac{1}{2} 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
\$\frac{1}{2} Salt & fresh pepper to taste
\$\frac{1}{2} 3 tbs. red wine or cider vinegar



** Cook and chill the barley. The day or 2 before is fine. Put chilled ** barley in a large bowl and set aside. Using a food processor (or a ** good knife), finely chop fresh carrots and celery. Add fresh and all ** other ingredients into chilled barley. Toss and let sit for 30 minutes, ** toss again and serve.

You can add other veggies to taste (peppers and zucchini are really nice). Toss in feta chees and sliced black olives for a Greek twist. It's great with any meat and very satisfying. Enjoy!

There have been 17 panther remains recovered in 2019. Fourteen of the deaths were caused by vehicles, three deaths were due to other causes.

All of the deceased animals were found in either Lee, Hendry or Collier County.

On a positive note, three litters have been documented so far this year. Each litter contained two kittens, of which 4 are female and two males.

Attorney General William P. Barr today announced that Corey F. Ellis has been named Acting Director of the Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys (EOUSA). Ellis is filling the position that has been held since December 2017 by James A. Crowell IV, who was nominated by President Donald Trump and confirmed by the U.S. Senate to serve as a judge on the Superior Court of the District of Columbia.

Prior to this appointment, which will be effective September 16, Ellis served in several positions in the Office of the Deputy Attorney General, including Chief of Staff to Deputy Attorney General Rod J. Rosenstein. Before joining the Deputy Attorney General's office, Ellis was the First Assistant United States Attorney in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Western District of North Carolina, where he began as an Assistant United States Attorney in 2005. Although statewide the population of the white ibis is in decline, this



unmistakable bird is found abundantly throughout Southwest Florida. Its long de-curved beak and its legs turn bright red when the white ibis is in breeding plumage. The distinctive black tips at the end of each wing when in flight make it an easy bird to identify. The juvenile is a mottled brown, similar in coloration to an adult limpkin. On the mainland you can sometimes find a similar species, the glossy ibis, which is the same size and shape but a dark blue-brown color similar to an oil slick. The immature glossy looks

virtually identical to the immature white ibis.

The ibis was a particular favorite with early Florida homesteaders, producing an edible breast slightly larger than that of a popular game bird, the ruffed grouse—hence the nickname Chokoloskee chicken. Ibis were hunted throughout Florida well into the 1950s. Even today it is an easy bird to approach and still is hunted illegally in certain areas.

The white ibis feeds on fish, frogs, crabs, insects, and small reptiles. It mates for life and generally nests in large colonies with other wading birds. It is preyed upon by alligators and eagles, and its nesting sites are raided by raccoons and bobcats. Its predominant threat statewide is habitat destruction.

Like the cattle egret's natural migration, the glossy ibis probably made its way to this side of the Atlantic from Western Africa via the trade winds or possibly caught up in hurricane winds. It was first seen along the northern edge of South America and has been expanding its range ever since. The glossy ibis is the most widespread ibis species in the world, with populations in Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia, South America, and North America.

Similar in behavior to the cattle egret, the glossy ibis is rapidly acclimatizing to urban and suburban developments. This adaptable bird can often be found foraging along the grassy fringes of parking lots, ball fields, and agricultural areas. The North American population is still expanding, moving into coastal Georgia, South Carolina, and all the way north into Maine.

The brownish immature glossy ibis can easily be mistaken for an immature white ibis. Both birds achieve adult plumage within the first year, however, after which it is all but impossible to confuse the two. The glossy ibis is slightly smaller than the white ibis. Both birds wield distinctive de-curved bills, which they use to ferret out insects, crayfish, grasshoppers, snakes, and grubs. They use these long, slender bills to probe deeply into soft, damp soil in search of prey. Unlike the white ibis, the glossy ibis is rarely found along the coastal beaches, preferring the near-coastal and mainland regions of Florida.

The glossy ibis nests in colonies of other herons and egrets. Its nests are subject to predation by snakes, raccoons, bobcats, opossums, and rats. The adult bird is taken by alligators, great horned owls, and bald eagles, but its reproductive abilities are such that the statewide population is still increasing. Its exceptionally long life span, up to 21 years, is also a factor in its ability to flourish.

Everglades Backcountry Experience Captain Rodney Raffield

Capt. Rodney here with some more fish stories for all of my Mullet Rapper friends...



Fishing this past month has been incredible with great numbers of Snook and Reds being caught in the Islands as well as the outside points.

It has not been uncommon for my clients to have 50 fish mornings on Reds and Snook combined, albeit they are running on

the small side. That being said, we have managed limits on Reds most every trip this past month.

We are in the rainy season which calls for a good early morning start if your goal is to get the best bite as well as not get wet.

Also, all the fresh water has the fish pushed out of the Backcountry and onto the oyster reefs and outside points.

Trout have still been on the slow side for us but there have been enough around for us to manage a Trout dinner most Charters.

We are catching these fish best on Wiffelure and Zman paddle tails and don't be ashamed to tip with shrimp if needed.

This pattern should hold up until the rains slow down and fish should start working their way to the back by late October.

So get out there and take advantage of the wide open water before our northern friends come back to join in on the fun. Till next time tight lines my friends.

Clyde and Niki Butcher host a fall festival at their Big Cypress Gallery in October every year. As part of the fun, special swamp walks behind the gallery are available for the brave (and not-so-brave) of heart.

The walks are \$50 per person (kids 17and-under are free, no tickets required) with 100% of the proceeds supporting the Swamp Water and Me Program (SWAMP) in Big Cypress National Preserve. SWAMP is an outdoor science education program that introduces thousands of 6th-grade students from Collier County to the Big Cypress every year on school field trips.

Walks are offered both days in the morning and afternoon. Sign up to arrive between 9 AM and 12 noon for a morning walk, or between 12 noon and 3 PM for an afternoon walk, and you'll be assigned to the next available walk when you arrive on Saturday or Sunday. Walks will leave every half hour, rain-or-shine.



What to know: Be prepared to get wet. The walks are approximately 2-hours long and water levels may be waist deep in places with submerged obstacles and uneven terrain. Wear closed-toe shoes, clothes that can get wet and/or muddy (long pants, a long -sleeved shirt, and shoes with laces that will stay on your feet), and bring some dry clothes to change into after your walk. Children must be over 48 inches tall for the standard 2-hour walk. We will have special walks that are less strenuous for families with young children.

Southern Taurids: Next period of activity: Now through November 20th.

Next Peak -Southern Taurids will next peak on the Oct 9-

10, 2019 night. On this night, the moon will be 87% full. Next Peak night Oct 21 -22, 2019.

Orionids: Next period of activity: October 2nd to November 7th.

The Orionids are a medium strength shower that sometimes reaches high strength activity. In a normal year the Orionids produce 10-20 shower members at maximum.

Geminids: Next period of activity: December 4th to December 17th.

The Geminids are usually the strongest meteor shower of the year and meteor enthusiasts are certain to circle December 13 and 14 on their calendars. This is the one major shower that provides good activity prior to midnight.
